

Sustainable tourism



Sustainable tourism is responsible tourism that puts communities in travel destinations before tourists. It aims at limiting negative impacts to a destination such as environmental damage and economic leakage and promoting job creation, cultural heritage preservation and wildlife protection.

Travelling sustainably means, for example, staying at locally-owned accommodation, avoiding dining at international chain restaurants and cafes, shopping in local markets, buying gifts made by local artisans, participating in responsible wildlife tourism and using efficient forms of transport.
